EDISON'S ISOLATED COMPANY.

The Edison Electric Light Company, which owns Edison's patents for North and South America, has just licensed a new company, called the Edison Company for Isolated Lighting, to use the Edison patents in all parts of the United States outside of present gas limits. A large business has already been successfully developed in lighting isolated factories and large buildings. The following places are now lighted by the Edison company:—The Pemberton Mills, Lawrence, Mass.; the Baldwin Locomotive Works, Philadelphia; the factories of Hinds, Ketchum & Co., and of Nathan & Dreyfus, New York city; the factory of Moore, Tinsue & Co., Portchester; the Orange woolen mills and the Newburg woolen mills, United States Rolling Stock Company's works in Chicago and in Urbana, the Winona Mills in Winona, Minn. The new company, which has a capital of \$500,000, gives one-half of its stock fully paid to the Edison Electric Light Company for a license. The following officers in the new company were elected on Wednesday:—S. B. Eaton, president; Eusto P. Fabbri, treasurer; Calvin Goddard, secretary; M. F. Moore, general manager. Executive Committee—James H. Banker, E. P. Fabbri and S. B. Eaton. The directors of the new company are:—Messrs. Edison, Banker, Lowrey, Fabbri, Eaton, Flagler and Adeworth.
